18/02/160 Police Report

Figures below.. I'm afraid we can't be there as PC Adam Speers has broken his hand and is off for some time yet, and Mike McGauley is on a day shift that day.

You will see that although there has been a rise in recorded offences during Jan 18 compared to Jan 17, the numbers are still very low, 1's and 2's all the way down. **Also, these figures are for Seaton Rural which isn't just Colyton, but I can't drill it down any closer.**

We have been very proactive lately both here and Sidmouth cracking down on teenagers using cannabis and ecstasy and you will see an increase in drugs possession offences as a result.

The main focus of concern in Colyton will probably be the recent break in to the convenience store. Nothing was taken but the offenders did go to some lengths to avoid capture, spraying CCTV cameras with paint and even cut a tree down across Coly Road to prevent access from the A3052. Enquiries are ongoing with Honiton CID.

The incidents, as opposed to offences, are down which does correlate with our proactivity detecting offences that haven't been reported by the public.

Hope that all makes sense and normal service will resume as soon as possible,

With regards to the joy riding incident at the Playing Fields I will do my best to generate some patrols in that area, but as you may know, due to injury and illness my two Seaton colleagues are out of action at present. However, we do also have response Officers in East Devon and I will bring it to their attention too.

18/02/161 Public Question time (maximum 15 minutes)

A Sidmouth Rd resident commented on the CeramTech presentation. Her concern was that 80 houses and the offices would create a lot of traffic movement with only one access. She was disappointed that there had been no provision made for the school parking, given the close proximity of the proposed development to the school and the inevitable increase in traffic.

18/02/162 The minutes of Parish Council Meeting held on 8th January 2018 were approved and signed as being a true record of that meeting.

18/02/163 Matters arising from the Minutes - none

18/02/164 Report from County Councillor - February report emailed to Councillors and will be attached to the minutes. *Report given later in the meeting but reported here in agenda order.* Cllr Shaw reported mainly on Health issues. No proposals had been made on the future of the Community hospital building. There will be a consultation on the services provided and an event in Seaton is to be held to which local community groups will be asked to send representatives to have a conversation about local health provision. This will discuss how voluntary organisations can help reinforce the care service and what services the community wants to see delivered in the local area to benefit the local community. (Honiton & Ottery St Mary have hosted such events).

The date will be March 23rd in Seaton Town Hall from 0930 – 1230 and formal invitations will go out soon and he encouraged councillors to come to the meeting if at all possible.

The DCC annual meeting, at which Council Tax will be set, is on 15th February and an increase in Council Tax is expected due to reduced central government funding and more demands on the services provided.

The Pothole Action Fund is still awaiting a final decision re distribution and the amount available.

Cllr Hay commented on the collapsed bank at Ridgeway two years on and still not repaired. Stephen Kelly is aware and Cllr Shaw will chase this up with him

Cllr Gibbins commented on the cost of providing the VAS at Gulley shoot, a total of £3700 which seems exorbitant! Cllr Shaw commented that they were guided by the engineers.

Cllr Pady expressed concern that provision of the zebra crossing was in jeopardy because of the school bus parking chaos where 8 buses turn up at once and park nose to tail down the road. Cllr Shaw said he was aware of the situation and believed Tom Vaughn was going to speak to the school. Cllr Gibbins asked Cllr Shaw to guarantee that Highways will be approached. Why can't the zebra crossing be implemented and anyone parking on it dealt with under the current traffic laws? This was echoed by Cllr Tattershall. Cllr Shaw said that he recognised that this was a top priority for Colyford and the CPC and that the DCC were committed to providing a crossing. Cllr Hay asked when the next batch of double yellow lines would be considered as the traffic refuge on South Street was being used for parking and the only solution would be to place double yellow lines there? Cllr Shaw said that proposals should be in by the end of March for consultation in June.

Cllr Real commented on the good job done down at Colyford with the new wall and Cllr Tattershall explained that the sandbags used there were the base of a Devon bank and had been seeded with grass and wildflowers.

A Colyford resident reiterated the need for a zebra crossing for Colyford but was worried about where the buses might end up parking as the surrounding roads are already congested and the best idea would be if the buses could come along in relay as previous discussed.

18/02/165 Report from District Councillor - Cllr H Parr detailed the start of the Green Waste collection from May. This will be a subscription service at an annual cost of £48 and the 240l wheelie bin supplied will be emptied on a fortnightly service for 11 months with a break taken over Christmas and the New Year. No side waste will be collected and there are details on the internet of the acceptable materials or a list can be obtained through the post if you ring EDDC.

18/02/166 Highway Matters

Cllr Pady reported that there had been a meeting on 12th Jan with Highways, Neil Parish and Cllr Shaw along with speedwatch representatives and members of the public where the speedwatch representatives had expressed their dismay at the lack of response from DCC even when faced with mounting evidence of speeding vehicles. Mike Jones the Highways engineer had identified a location for a much need zebra crossing opposite the Church and the funding is in place for it with designs drawn up but it's being held hostage to the chaos of the school bus parking, where up to 8 coaches turn up and park nose to tail down the road and would encroach on the proposed crossing. Coach companies need to stagger their arrival and it's a great disappointment to the residents of Colyford that this is not being done, can CPC not engage with the school and bus companies? Cllr Gibbins asked why the crossing couldn't be built and the buses fined if they park on or across it? Cllr Real though this may be an excuse not to build it and why should the onus be on the Parish Council. There was some discussion on the situation and it was resolved to place this on the next agenda where the meeting will be in Colyford. Cllr Pady proposed a letter is written to Highways, seconded by Cllr Gibbins and agreed by all.

18/02/167 Report from Meetings Attended

- a) Public Consultation re Ceram Tech site (6th February 2018). Cllr Parr declared an interest as he is a tenant on the land.

Cllr Real was appalled at the presentation. Homes England had not listened to the CPC's concerns and had taken no notice of the Housing needs assessment survey. No affordable homes were being provided in that proposal and no school car parking or live/work units. There was discussion on the infrastructure of the town and the ability of the current sewage system to cope with the increase in residential numbers. The traffic problem was also discussed and there was a feeling from Cllr Pady that not all 7 acres should be developed for housing but some maintained as a green space, possibly bought by a CLT and used for recreation & school parking. This could then possibly be released for building when required.

- i) CLT response – 9 members of the public had registered their interest and Cllr Pady proposed the CPC hosts a public meeting to discuss the formation of a CLT, inviting Geoff Pook from Beer and representatives from the Wessex CLT Trust

Seconded by Cllr Norris and agreed by all.

- b) Public Consultation re Colyford homes

Cllr Parr had attended this meeting and felt that the developers were trying to put far too many houses into such a space and this erosion of the green wedge goes against what the Parish Council wants from that area. This is creeping development on a green wedge which the CPC wants to maintain. EDDC have already commented that Colyford is a sustainable community which does not require any more development.

County Councillor's Report, February 2018**Community 'conversation' about health in Honiton**

I attended a half-day gathering on 'Honiton's Health Matters' at the Beehive. This was a constructive gathering of about 60 people, with representatives of many community groups, which heard speakers from the RD&E, the Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), local doctors and others. Round-table workshop discussions had a big emphasis on improving coordination among voluntary organisations and their connections with NHS services. **Proposed Seaton and district health event**

The Honiton event, and a similar in Okehampton, are the first in a series of 'conversations' proposed by the CCG and RD&E to enable communities centred on 'market towns' to say what they want from 'place-based' delivery of health care.

I am helping to plan a similar gathering for the Seaton area in March: it will not be a public meeting but will be open to all community organisations concerned with health and wellbeing in a broad sense. This will be our opportunity to say which services we want delivered locally, including in Seaton hospital.

Report by the CCG and NHS Property Services on future of hospital buildings

After I raised this at the September and November meetings of Health Scrutiny, the Committee received a report at its meeting on 25th January. While NHS Property Services now owns the hospitals and communities have no legal rights as a result of their contributions, NHS PS acknowledged that they are 'always happy to work with local communities to consider local services'.

Scrutiny's resolution requested that NHS PS 'uphold this undertaking' and keeps the Committee informed on the timeline for changes in the status of the hospitals. Crucially, there will be no precipitate decisions on the future of the buildings, but the CCG will decide what space they need after the community conversations on 'place-based' care. Hopeful signs that the CCG include the RD&E's publicity for increased use of the Minor Injury Unit at Honiton; the introduction of FORCE Chemotherapy into Okehampton Hospital; and NHS PS's emphasis on the Budleigh hub. While there are no guarantees that these will be replicated in Seaton, they emphasise the importance of the conversations now beginning. **Performance of the NHS in**

Devon and the winter crisis

Also at Health Scrutiny, it was reported that bed-blocking has been halved since the 'new model of care' was introduced. However I referred to figures which show that performance of the RD&E and the other 3 Devon trusts on key waiting time targets for A&E, cancer care and planned operations has all got worse in the last 12 months. Unfortunately the NHS organisations, including the ambulance services, failed to provide proper reports on the winter crisis, but Claire Wright insisted on information being made available quickly to the committee.

Devon Accountable Care System (ACS) and Accountable Care Organisations (ACOs)

The ACS is a new framework for the NHS in Devon from 1st April, which could lead to the development of ACOs later in 2018/19. ACOs could involve 10- to 15-year contracts being agreed for all services in Devon, which Jeremy Hunt has confirmed will be open to private providers. These contracts could lead to permanent rationing of care, since patients will only be entitled to what is contracted, built-in differences in standards across the country, and loss of scrutiny as

private providers can claim commercial confidentiality. The contracts are being challenged in the courts, the Health Select Committee is urgently looking at them, and NHS England has been forced to agree to a 12-week consultation. Deplorably, the Devon Accountable Care System was not brought to Health Scrutiny until I exercised my right to put it on the agenda. As a result, the Committee will examine it at a special meeting (unless the ACS is postponed, in which case this will be on March 22nd). I told Health Scrutiny that there is no public consensus for private contractors running Devon's NHS. Council Tax I expect that DCC, which has lost £15m of central government funding and faces increased pressures from social care, will agree another above-inflation increase. Highways will face reductions: the only funding for local roads in 2018-19 may be the £47k Pothole Action Fund.

Colyford

CROSSING: A likely location was reported at a meeting which I chaired including Neil Parish MP. Highways will discuss issues with the Grammar School in order to progress this. **VEHICLE ACTIVATED SIGNS:** a location for a 2nd sign has been agreed, but must await a replacement lamppost later in 2018. I hope that funding for both signs will be finalised soon. **NEW 52 BUS SERVICE.** I pressed for this to include Colyford but it will not for the time being. Colyton & Southleigh

PATCHING will begin soon (Records X to Blackbury Camp, Downhayne & Ridgeway Lanes). Seaton

TOURIST SIGNAGE SCHEME: I helped broker an agreement, including a donation from my Locality budget, and this has now been signed off. **SEATON DOWN HILL:** work on a new pedestrian refuge is about to begin and I am awaiting advice on the funding of the 40 mph limit, which is agreed in principle.

HARBOUR ROAD CROSSING: Highways are unlikely to have the funding for this in 2018-19. I propose that the Town Council and residents join me in approaching Tesco, who had to remove the crossing they originally installed.
